Oregon OSHA - Adopted Changes To Portable Fire Extinguishers in General Industry

Oregon OSHA is changing the rules on portable fire extinguishers because of issues discovered when the Office of State Fire Marshal (OFSM) adopted the latest version of National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 10, Standard for Portable Fire Extinguishers. We are also using this rule making opportunity to correct some minor issues not related to the NFPA.

We added one definition and clarified another to aid in understanding to the rule. Several changes are purely grammatical for clarity.

The major change removes language about using people or companies certified by the OFSM to do maintenance on extinguishers. New language reads that these people or companies must be acceptable to local fire authorities. We also clarified the difference between "maintenance" and "internal examination" of fire extinguishers.

This is Oregon OSHA Administrative Order 10-2008, **adopted and effective December 31**, **2008**.
