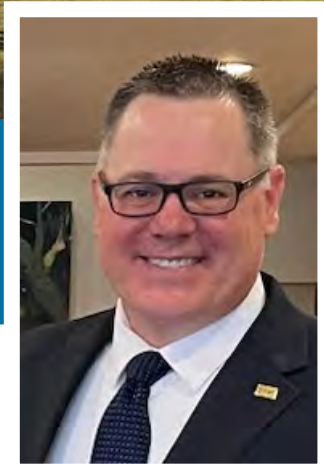

### **Root Cause Analysis** (1-4:30 p.m.)

This three-hour root cause analysis session provides attendees with a practical, structured approach to identifying, analyzing, and eliminating the underlying causes of incidents, near misses, and operational failures. Participants learn how to use proven tools such as the "five whys," fishbone diagrams, causal factor charts, and event mapping to move beyond symptoms and uncover true contributing factors. The presentation focuses on real-world application, guiding attendees through step-by-step methodologies, common pitfalls, effective data collection, and techniques for facilitating cross-functional investigations. By the end of the session, attendees are equipped to conduct thorough root cause analyses, develop actionable corrective actions, and strengthen their organization's overall safety and reliability performance.
