Intro to Occupational Medicine

Occupational medicine specializes in the diagnosis and treatment of injuries sustained in the workplace while also encapsulating medical surveillance and regulatory compliance programs. This is a unique field of medicine where the provider is knowledgeable about OSHA standards and can support the employer and employee with work-related injuries and illnesses. Dr. Nwaneshiudu is pleased to provide an introduction to occupational medicine, the origins of this specialty within the medical field, and the benefits of incorporating occupational medicine into your company's safety program versus using a primary care physician or urgent care clinic.

Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM): A Peer Support Overview

Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) is a formal, highly structured, and professionally recognized process for helping those involved in a critical incident to share their experiences, vent emotions, learn about stress reactions and symptoms, and given referral for further help if required. It is an intervention protocol developed specifically for dealing with traumatic events. CISM is not psychotherapy, but rather a confidential, voluntary, and instructive process, sometimes called "psychological first aid." It is an intervention involving a group meeting or discussion about a particularly distressing critical incident. There are several types of CISM interventions that can be used, depending on the situation. Variations

of these interventions can be used for groups, individuals, families, and in the workplace. This session includes an overview of the 40-hour CISM course a discussion of key components.
